
In-person, Remote, or Hybrid? Planning a Conference that Works for All

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Digital Humanities Institute

The Digital Humanities Institute (DHI) is a conference that brings together digital humanities enthusiasts from across the state of North Carolina to discuss digital pedagogy, digital research methods, and digital projects.











Virtual

Virtual events allow people from all over the country to attend, but may not be as engaging.

In-Person

In-person events offer opportunities for networking, but not all are able to attend.

Hybrid

Live streaming of an in-person event increases access, but can be plagued by technical problems.

New Hybrid

Offer both wholly virtual and wholly in-person options to get the best of both formats.

Hybrid schedule of events

Virtual sessions

- Virtual, asynchronous engagement opportunities leading up to the event via Lightning Talks <u>video playlist</u> and corresponding <u>discussion board</u>
- A full day of live, virtual sessions
- Ended with a live, virtual plenary session

In-person events

 In-person meet-ups throughout the state to facilitate networking



Challenges & Solutions

In-person inconsistencies

Challenge: Some of the in-person meet-ups were less planned and thus less attended.

Solution: Provide more structure and oversight to collaborators.

Zoom room settings

Challenge: Zoom room settings varied by session (e.g., enabling chat for participants).

Solution: Triple check settings with the technical support team, since multiple people helped set up.

Lower attendance

Challenge: There was lower attendance for the Friday virtual session (while Thursday sessions were fairly well attended).

Solution: Cause is unclear, but it would help to clarify to attendees which sessions will be recorded.

Feedback

Attendees appreciated

- Flexibility this version of hybrid offered
- Communication on logistics before and after the event (reminder emails, follow-up survey)

Participation

- Recordings of presentations, especially the lightning talks, were highly viewed (295 views)
- There was a fair amount of engagement with the online discussion board that accompanied the lightning talks
